



Greg Lowry is the Walter J. Blenko, Sr. Professor of Civil and Environmental Engineering at Carnegie Mellon University. He is the Deputy Director of the NSF/EPA Center for Environmental Implications of Nanotechnology (CEINT), and an Associate Editor of *Environmental Science: Nano*. Dr. Lowry is also the PI on a multi-national US/EU grant entitled NanoFARM investigating the fate, effects, benefits and risks associated with nano-enabled fertilizers and

fungicides. Dr. Lowry holds a B.S. in Chemical Engineering from the University of California at Davis, an M.S. and Ph.D. in Civil and Environmental Engineering from the University of Wisconsin at Madison and Stanford University, respectively. His research and teaching focuses on understanding the environmental fate and effects of organic chemicals and engineered nanomaterials, and how the unique properties of engineered nanomaterials can be safely leveraged for applications in water treatment and food production. He has authored or co-authored more than 120 peer-reviewed journal articles. Dr. Lowry has received awards from the ASCE (Walter L. Huber Civil Engineering Research Award), the AEESP (Malcolm Pirnie/AEESP Frontiers in Research Award), and the ACS (Best Feature Article in *ES&T* for 2012). He was recognized as a highly cited researcher (top 1%) in the area of environment and ecology by Thompson Reuters in 2014 and 2015. Dr. Lowry has served as PI or Co-PI on grants from the National Science Foundation, U.S. Department of Defense, U.S. Department of Energy, and U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, and from industry. He currently serves on the EPA Science Advisory Board (Environmental Engineering committee), the AEESP board, and advisory boards for two international research Centers, NanoFASE and NANOREM. He served on the National Research Council Committee to Develop a Research Strategy for Environmental Health and Safety Aspects of Engineered Nanomaterials.
